### Meetings

Meetings for the next quarter are scheduled for April 24th, May 22nd and June 19th. The exception in June on the 3rd Thursday is for the 9th annual Jess Fest which will be held on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, June 19, 20 and 21, 2008. Everyone is invited to attend to see Jessamine County and do any research they wish. The JCHS office will be open on Thursday and Friday and local members will be in the office to assist members and guests.

### **Cemetery Update**

The Ison and Bryant families would like information on their six family members who died in the 1932 flood. They would like to mark the graves that are supposedly in the Maple Grove Cemetery where their death certificates record they are buried. Please advise the JCHS if you have any information.

Ernestine Hamm, Cemetery Committee Chair, hopes to restore the Samuel Offutt Cemetery in Tates Creek Trailer Park. This cemetery is connected to Abraham Lincoln who was employed at one time by Denton Offutt, which story is told in "The Little Trader from Hickman Creek" in the book

Lincoln and the Bluegrass by William H. Townsend.

Howard Teater has received permission to restore the Jasper Griffing Cemetery on the Glass family farm located on US Hwy 27 South near Camp Nelson.

The Revolutionary War tombstone for Thomas Rickett has been received and boy scouts will help us finish restoring the Rickett/Davis Cemetery, his burial place. Sam Wingate will receive his Eagle Scout Badge for this project.

The fallen tree in the Crockett Cemetery has been cleared. Ernestine will get bids to repair the iron fence on which it fell. Bids will also be taken from a couple of reputable professional tree removal companies for a standing dead tree that needs to be removed.

The JCHS will try to get a stone for Mr. James Hervey, who died in 1888 and is buried in the Lexington Cemetery, by next year. Mr. Hervey, a banker, owned several acres in Nicholasville where he built affordable homes for the black population. The area was called "Hervey Town" for many years.

Ernestine showed a video at the January meeting of the very old Dickerson Cemetery on Union Mill Pike. Hopefully, more stones will be found and then a fence put up.

### **Miscellany**

The new welcome signs for Nicholasville have been corrected to read "Founded 1798, Incorporated 1812." This is a big accomplishment for the Jessamine County Historical Society.

We are grateful for the free rent from Lanny Dale and the Farmers Bank over several years so we continue to try to fix the water leak in the front office.

A letter has been received from the John Fox, Jr. Genealogical Library of the Kentucky Society DAR located at Duncan Tavern Historical Center in Paris, KY, thanking the JCHS for its donation of the Jessamine County Revolutionary War Soldier Location Index. Our thanks to member Alice Hills for her suggestion of this donation and for sharing her research work on Revolutionary War Soldiers.

At the January monthly meeting, members approved submitted signage proofs for our neighbor business, First Insurance Group, to be placed on the front of the building and at their front door. The Nicholasville City board asked that they seek our approval.

### Tribute to Howard Fain (1934 - 2007)

A long time JCHS member, Howard was a beloved author and artist and his work is found in all 50 states as well as several foreign countries. He was owner and operator of the Howard Fain Gallery in Nicholasville from 1968 to 1997 and he continued working from his home until his retirement in 1999. His Kentucky American print was released for America's 200th birthday. Churches, schools, and historic buildings were his favorite subjects. He published over 400 pieces of art in limited edition and did more than 650 private commissions for collectors all over the world. Our hearts go out to his wife, Ruth Ann, and the rest of his family. He is sorely missed by many who knew and loved him.
