Cemetery Update by Ernestine Hamm

We are in the midst of fall cleanup and have had a number of large trees fall, taking down some fences.

We have finished the John A. Brooks Cemetery located on Cream Ridge at Little Hickman.

Work has begun on the Gregg/McCampbell Cemetery on Union Mill Pike. This cemetery was vandalized and many of the stones are broken into small pieces. This cemetery is located on part of the William Hays land. It was also the home of William T. Barry, famous lawyer, for whom a statue was erected in the courthouse yard in

Fayette County. He also had his law office here in a small wooden structure (see Bennett Young's book).

A stone for Alford Douglas who died in 1871 was found in this cemetery. There is also an investigation being done to prove this is the land where Daniel Boone had his last home in Jessamine County, a two-story log structure.

Research is being done to acquire a military headstone for two brothers who were Revolutionary War soldiers, Thomas and Henry Overstreet. Consent has been given to fence this cemetery because of cattle damage. It is located in the Bethel area.

Ms. June Lowry has given permission for work to begin on the cemetery located on her farm at High Bridge. It is the Campbell/Wilmore Cemetery and we hope to find Robert Campbell, a Revolutionary War soldier, buried there. We are also looking for Peter Pollack (spellings vary). He is a Revolutionary War soldier who married Mary Poore and is said to be buried in the Jack Bradshaw family cemetery at High Bridge.

One of our projects that will be carried over till next year is a possible cemetery preservation grant to restore the Samuel Hunter Cemetery at Logana. This area also must be fenced before restoration can begin. Samuel Hunter was one of three brothers, including Jacob and John, who were the first permanent white settlers in Jessamine County. They were also chain carriers for the Douglas and Hite surveyors. Both Jacob's and John's wives received widows pensions. We are still looking for records for

Samuel. They also built one of only three stations in Jessamine County, located very near the graveyard. A son of John Hunter was the first white child to be born in Jessamine County. We hope to place a plaque with all this historical information at the cemetery.

It was reported at the July monthly meeting that a Jessamine County Fiscal Court \$1,000 stipend has been received. It is much needed and appreciated. Our cemetery work could not be done if it were not for this support.

The stone for Revolutionary War soldier Thomas Ricketts has been set and was shown on film at the August 28th meeting.

The Isaac Shelby Cemetery and the cemetery at High Point Golf Course have been vandalized. The Jessamine County Sheriff made reports.

Howard Downing, Attorney, has been helping find the location of George Walker's grave and has found a deed.

Miscellany

The Historical Society donated \$25.00 to support the Camp Nelson **National** Cemetery caisson program headed by Terry Lucas, who provides a caisson for military funerals. This caisson provides a very touching and somber scene as it bears the remains of those fallen veterans who have served our country. Terry appreciates any donation made for this effort. You may forward any donation to the JCHS at our address below and we will see that Terry receives it.

Getting a dedicated computer line for the JCHS office was investigated so that program updates and queries could be handled at the office. However, all sources proved to be more expensive than the Society could afford so the issue has been closed.

Terry Todd, an out-of-town member, and his family wish to place an historical marker for

Todd's Ferry at Brooklyn Bridge. Terry is gathering the background data necessary for the application and the JCHS agreed to sponsor his request. The Todd family will pay for the marker.

The Jessamine County School System donated many various kinds of books to the Society. Those of historical significance were kept for the JCHS Billy Bower Memorial Library and those not kept are being sold.

The Fourth of July historical marker on Route 68 has been replaced. Permission to move it down Clear Creek Road has been sent to Frankfort and it looks hopeful that this may be approved. Many thanks to Kathy Hall for donating funds to replace this marker.

As many of you are aware, the price of metals has gone up and our highway markers are taking the brunt of many thefts. If you notice a Jessamine County historical highway marker missing, please report it to the JCHS.

Work is continuing on the Billy Jackson Bower 5th Book. Some research remains, and some map identification and credits remain to be done. We are hoping to get this completed in the near future and then determine a time table for publication.

Meetings This Quarter:

July 24: Bettye Lee Mastin, well-known architectural authority on Central Kentucky historic homes and long-time Lexington Herald-Leader columnist, spoke about old houses in Jessamine County. She showed pictures from her collection of old log homes, different types of brick houses, i.e., the common bond and Flemish bond patterns, and the different types of timber used in constructing these older homes. This was a very informative presentation and a good-sized crowd enjoyed learning about our early homes.

August 29: Speaker was Terry Lucas, who is involved with the Camp Nelson National Cemetery Honor Guard. Mr. Lucas is seeking donations to build a six-horse caisson to bestow the highest honor upon soldiers killed in the line of duty. Fifty gold stars will be placed on the caisson and they can be purchased for \$500 each in honor of a loved one or a veteran. The Camp Nelson Honor Guard is run entirely by volunteers and donations.

<u>September 25</u>: The guest speaker was Charles Bogart, manager of the Fort Boone Civil War Park. He gave an interesting presentation about railroads and forts during the Civil War era. He stressed that railroads played a very important role in the Civil War and were much more efficient than horse and wagon to move supplies. He showed many maps of the railroads and forts of that time.
