### "Freedom is not free" by Janelle Fain

As we celebrate Independence day (4th of July) we pay tribute to all veterans for giving us that freedom.

From childhood days I remember Uncle Marvin. He was a brother to my mother, Pearl Stinnett Fain; born in Jessamine Co. 15 February 1910 to Wilmert and Fannie Woodward Stinnett. He died 3 January 1999 at Thomson-Hood Veterans Center in Wilmore, KY. While there he told his military stories. These would have remained untold except for the brotherhood there that aroused the past in his mind.

In his teen years he left Jessamine Co. -- found housing and employment in Louisville, KY, making a successful life of his own. 24 February 1944 he joined the Army, mustered in at Ft. Benjamin; Harrison, Indiana. Battles and campaigns were: Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe. He was on the line during the Battle of the Bulge. Countries in which he traveled in order were: Scotland, England, France, Belgium, Holland, Luxembourg, and Germany. Decorations and Citations: American Theater Ribbon, EAME Theater Ribbon, W/3 Bronze Stars, Good Conduct Medal, Victory Medal WWII, Croix De Guerre. Rank: Sergeant, Co. I, 109th Infantry. Discharge was honorable on 7 February 1946, Camp Atterbury, Indiana.

Many soldiers brought home mementoes; he managed to get a violin and return to the USA with it. (not torn apart either)!!!! You see, he had taken lessons and learned to play quite well, having entertained at dinner clubs and with symphony groups in Louisville. His violin music was known in Jessamine Co. by family, friends and some churches as he played violin, Mother played the piano and sang numerous places and times.

Here I have in my possession mementos: post cards, photographs, French lesson book, money from other countries, military buttons and ribbons, V-notes, telegram, dog tag, Army exchange service ration card and my birth announcement he folded and carried; most importantly a New Testament shield Bible--with his initials engraved in gold-plated steel-protects the heart--fits snugly in uniform pocket--given to him by my Mother, (Love and Prayers, Your Sis, Pearl) handwritten inside the cover. These treasures tell of a man's service to his country and a bit of his well-lived time with us. Freedom is not free. Lives were laid on the line. History should not be ignored or forgotten.
